District 9 is one of 9 electoral districts in Nimba. It is the largest by land size and one of the poorest in terms of infrastructure and social services. It has 5 administrative districts - Mehnsonnoh, Zahnla, Blinlon, Doe, and Gbi-Doru and one of the most beautiful land spaces and one of the largest untouched forest in Liberia. It borders Grand Gedeh, Grand Bassa, Rivercess, and Bong County.

Funding Priorities



Our funding priorities will be based on our 6 key strategic focus areas and our fundraising efforts. Below, we have outlined our options based on funding priorities and the funds raised. *To jumpstart our development activities and deliver for our people, we need \$75,000.*

Option 1 100% Funded (\$555,000)

- With 100% funding, we will complete all activities and projects across all 6 strategic focus areas for Year 1:
 - 55% to Infrastructure
 - 7% to Education
 - 14% to Leadership
 - 3% to Empowerment
 - 6% to Agriculture
 - 15% to Health

Option 2 50 - 75% Funded (\$277,500 to \$416,250)

- With 50-75% funding, we will complete only 50-75% of the activities and projects across the 6 strategic focus areas for Year 1:
 - 60% to Infrastructure
 - 15% to Education
 - 10% to Leadership
 - 5% to Empowerment
 - 5% to Agriculture
 - 5% to Health

Option 3 25 -50% Funded (\$138,750 to \$277,500)

- With 25 to 50% funding, we will complete we will complete only 25-50% of the activities and projects across the 6 strategic focus areas for Year 1:
 - 65% to Infrastructure
 - 10% to Education
 - 10% to Leadership
 - 5% to Empowerment
 - 5% to Agriculture
 - 5% to Health



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
